
There Stands A Cross

We look and remember and know that at the end of our journey, there stands a cross.


Join us on Easter Sunday, April 17th, as our Chancel Choir, under the direction of Tina Smith, Choir Director, performs "There Stands A Cross".

Easter Sunday begins with a Sunrise service at 6:00 a.m. This service will be held in the fellowship hall and will include the flowering of the cross by the lake. The youth invite you to join them for breakfast immediately after the sunrise service. Be sure to worship with us at 11:am when the choir presents our Easter Cantata "There Stands the Cross".

A New Birth into a Living Hope

"As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you."

—Mark 16:5-7

It is amazing that after the Resurrection Jesus wanted to meet with the disciples who failed Him so deeply, yet He did and made special notice of Peter. Our natural assumption would be that Peter, the denier of Christ, would be the last person Jesus would want to meet with. But He did. Jesus wanted to meet with Peter because He had special hope, special forgiveness, special restoration for the one who denied Him the worst.

Our God seeks out with forgiving love those who live in sin and strayed away from His flock. Peter's forgiveness by Jesus illustrates the hope we have in the Resurrection. In 1 Peter 1:3, Peter writes, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead."

Easter is a time of celebration of that new birth into a living hope! In the Resurrection of Christ, we have hope in the assurance of our own resurrection: "For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died." (1Thessalonians 4:14).

Throughout this Easter season I encourage you to focus on your relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending yourself in faith. I encourage you to be in fellowship with your brothers and sisters here at Blountstown UMC and reflect our Lord's mission in joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

Why Christ Calls Us to Worship

Easter services are usually well attended, but what about other weeks? What draws you to worship on an "average" Sunday, and what might Jesus have in store for people in the pews?

Consider this from Pastor Charles Aaron; "Did we come to church this morning thinking it was a safe thing to do? Did we come with some expectation of receiving a blessing, a bit of comfort, but no real challenge? Did we think about the possibility that encountering Jesus would rearrange our lives, explode our priorities, cause us to give more than we ever expected? Did we think we could get a little something from Jesus, a dose of grace to help us through the week? Did we come for the fellowship, the music, the spiritual boost? No one can argue with those reasons."

He continues: "The risen Christ, however, may have had other plans for this worship service. Christ may want to come under our skins and transform us. Christ may see through us so that something we have well hidden comes to the surface. Christ may kick out from us the things we use to prop ourselves up but that we don't really need. Are we ready for that? Did we bargain on that when we walked through the door today?"

Christian Symbol

Paschal Candle—This large, white candle is an ancient symbol for Christ, the light of the world. The candle contains a cross and/or an Alpha and Omega to symbolize that Jesus is eternal and always present with his people. Also called the Easter candle, it plays a prominent role during Easter vigils and celebrations. Some churches also use the candle during baptisms and funerals.



Preaching outside the churches allowed John Wesley to become adept at open-air preaching, and reaching many who the Church of England had shown little concern.

This style of preaching was not easy; he encountered hostile crowds, bullying and abuse. During one sermon a bull was let loose in the audience where his was speaking.

John Wesley traveled the length and breadth of England on horseback, riding more than 4000 miles every year - covering 250,000 miles in his career. He preached 15 sermons weekly adding up to more than 40,000 sermons in his lifetime.
