WHAT'S YOUR NOVEMBER?

For Davey Blackburn, a pastor in Indiana, one particular month has brought "the highest of highs and the lowest of lows," He was born in November, moved to a new church in November 2011 and learned he's be a father in November 2013. But two years later, in November 2015, Blackburn's wife and unborn second child were murdered during a home invasion.



Despite that painful tragedy, the pastor determined not to "let the enemy have a claim over November" or "steal the many beautiful memories I once held" about it. Since then, his church's worship team recorded an album one November, he proposed to his second wife another November, launched a new ministry one November and welcome another child the following November.

That journey, Blackburn says, is evidence of God's faithfulness to replace a spirit of despair with a garment of praise (see Isaiah 61:3). And it's an important remainder for the holiday season, with all its memories and traditions. Just as God wants to heal and restore, Blackburn writes, "Your [deceased] loved one would not want your 'November' to haunt your memory forever."





Two ships set sail August 5,1620 bound for the New World. For two years, the Pilgrims had carefully planned and prepared for this venture. Barely a week out, the Speedwell sprung a leak. They returned to England and tried to make the ship seaworthy. Unable to do so, 102 passengers with a crew of perhaps 30, set for the New World in the Mayflower. The ship was about 100 feet from the beak of her prow to the stern and perhaps 25 feet wide; a bit longer than our sanctuary and half as wide. The 102 passengers were crammed in the 'tween deck, the space below the deck, about 4 ½ to five

feet high. During the trip, they encountered the tail end of two hurricanes and were blown off course. They had planned on joining the Virginia colony in Jamestown. But when they sighted land on



November 9, 1620, they were north of the boundary for the Virginia colony. They considered their options and decided they had been providentially directed to this location. On December 20, in the middle of falling snow, they disembarked onto Cape Cod. No welcoming party greeted them. No homes to go to, nothing but a barren strip of rocky coastline, cold and foreboding. They set out to build the most basic of protection and housing; huts really, mud and wattle, to shut out the wind. But every Sunday they stopped to worship and give God thanks for His mercies and care. In the bitter cold, they began to get sick from exposure. At one time, only 5 adults were able to care for those who were ill. They had begun to die; in November, 1; December, 6; January, 8, February, 14; March, 17; April, 5. By the spring, 51 of the 102 had died. Of the 18 families that had come to the New World, 13 families had lost a spouse. Only 5 couples remained intact. But each Sunday, they gathered for worship to give God thanks for His mercies.

In April, a native came into the compound and in perfect English, asked for beer. A few years earlier, Squanto had been taken captive by some English explorers. The year before, he had returned to the New World, but his tribe had been wiped out with disease. He helped these settlers learn how to plant corn, how and when to fish and recognize the edible native fruits and plants. Under his guidance, the planting of spring led to the growth in summer and the harvest in the fall. Reflecting on the survival and the successes of the year, Governor Bradford called for a day of Thanksgiving, to give God thanks for His goodness and mercy.

STARTING A RIPPLE EFFECT

Shortly before his death, 80-year old farmer Hody Childress asked his daughter to continue a practice he'd conducted for years: taking a \$100 bill to a local pharmacist on the first of every month. For years, Childress anonymously came to the aid of neighbors in Geraldine, Alabama, who couldn't afford medications. "Don't tell a soul where the money came from," he instructed store owner Brooke Walker. "If they ask, tell them it's a blessing form the Lord."

Thanks to the farmer's generosity, Walker could fill prescriptions for about 24 uninsured or underinsured people each year. "I was honored he allowed me to do that," she said, "and it really encouraged me to do the same in my life."

Childress wasn't wealthy but "always gave what he could," said his daughter Tania Nix. "I think he felt like he couldn't not give," she added. "Giving that way, that just got on his heart." After word spread about Childress' generosity, other people were inspired to perform stealth outreach and a fund was established in his name.

A man in Oklahoma who shares Childress' surname said a story about the farmer caught his attention. They're probably not related, he wrote, but he'd feel proud if they were. "A man like that surely tried to follow the example of Jesus," the Oklahoman wrote, and "[his] story inspires me to be a better man."




