

Martin Luther



His parents wanted him to be a lawyer, so he would be able to provide for them in their older years. When he was seventeen, he was walking home in a thunderstorm, when a bolt of lightning hit him. He was knocked to the ground, and called out, "Saint Anne, save me." Martin Luther survived the lightning strike and set out on his quest to find peace with God. He entered a monastery much to his parent's disappointment. He became the most disciplined of all the students; his prayer life the most stringent, his devotional life the most regular, his studies the most methodical. His zeal to master the disciplines the church taught that would result in his discovery of this peace was relentless. In his obsession, he became a nuisance to his abbot.

In desperation, the abbot sent Luther to Rome on business for the monastery. After concluding his business, Luther visited all the holy sites and followed all the prescribed rituals recommended for finding peace with God. When Luther climbed the 22 steps in the Vatican and prayed the prayers for each step, he stood up and protested I still have no peace. He returned to Germany and the monastery. The abbot assigned him to teaching the Book of Psalms to the younger monks. When Luther reached Psalm 22, he read, "All my bones are on display; people stare and gloat over me. They divide my clothes among them and cast lots for my garment." He recognized the psalmist was referring to Jesus, the Son of God. If the Son of God, who had not sinned, suffered and died, how could he, Luther, ever do enough penance to make up for his sins, and be set right with God. He couldn't. It was impossible. The only way peace with God would ever be possible was by faith, by taking God at his word, and by faith, asking for forgiveness. Martin Luther did just that. In His mercy and kindness, God forgave Luther's sins. He began to recognize that the church's practice of and requirement for indulgences to receive forgiveness and find peace with God was not biblical.

On October 31, 1517, he nailed his 95 theses, or grievances, on the door of Wittenberg Cathedral, announcing his challenge for debate of these teaching of the Catholic church. That was the beginning of the Protestant Reformation, that spread across Europe, and provided the head waters for all of the various streams of the Protestant Churches. Our fundamental and unifying conviction is that we are set right with God by faith, faith alone. The church plays a significant role in our understanding of this truth. But the choice of our relationship with God is our individual choice. And it is by believing that Jesus Christ is the Son of God and accepting Him into our lives as Savior and Lord. And our lives are forever changed by this truth.


